Australia	24,641,662
Fiji	902,547
America	326,474,013
India	1,342,512,796

1. Which country has the largest population?
2. Which country has the smallest population?
3. New Zealand has an approximate population of 4,600,000.



Which country in the table is closest in population to New Zealand?

4. Hamish learns that the distance from New Zealand to China is 11160 kilometres (km). Natasha finds out that South Korea is 9794 km from New Zealand.

Which country is closest to New Zealand?

Bob and his friends go to the tuck shop at lunch time to buy a treat.



5. Juicies in the tuck shop cost \$1.

If 47 children each buy a Juicie, how much money is paid to the tuck shop?

6. A pie costs \$2.50. Bob pays \$5. How much change will he get?

7. If Finn buys 2 pies, one for himself and one for his friend, Malachi, how much will it cost?

8. Finn pays for the two pies with a \$10 note, how much change does he get from Mrs Snacksrus, the tuck shop lady?

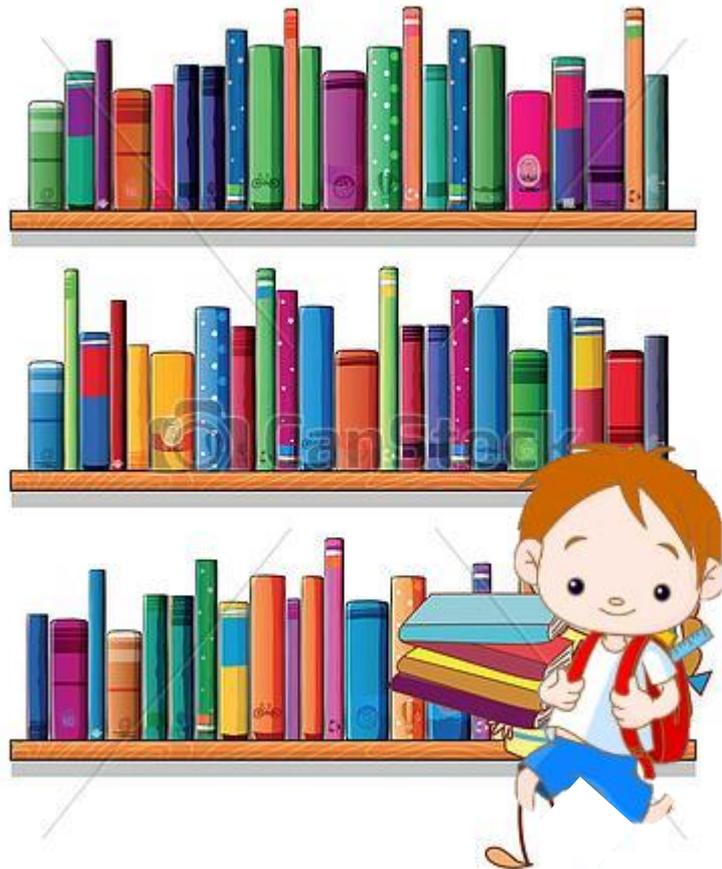


Library Hour!

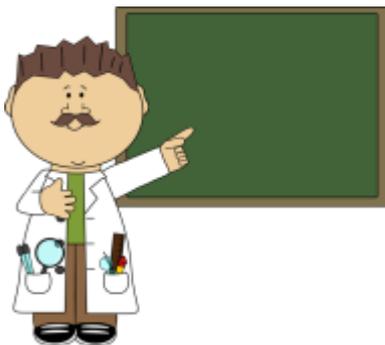
Bob loves the library because it is a warm, snuggly place, and it has no maths...
